

READER,

Washington Conversation Voters has analyzed and evaluated the performance of our elected representatives in Olympia. We have worked hard to accurately reflect the voting record of each individual legislator on issues that matter to Washington State Voters: clean air and water, preservation of open spaces and wetlands, urban sprawl, and transportation.

Before each general election, our County Chapters throughout the state evaluate their legislator's performance using our Scorecard as a guide. After careful evaluation and personal interviews, our local chapters endorse environmentally-committed candidates and incumbents, and then do everything from doorbell with candidates to make phone calls on their behalf. Our chapter members are the grassroots backbone of Washington Conservation Voters and it is their work that allows us to win approximately 90% of the elections we target. Through their efforts, we are closer to our goal of electing a pro-environment majority in the legislature.

The past two legislative sessions demonstrated that we have made significant gains in working with urban and suburban legislators from both parties. We will continue to build strong non-partisan relationships while concentrating on identifying and articulating the shared values between rural legislators and the environmental community.

Following completion of the 2002 session, professionals from Washington's environmental organizations made nominations suggesting which votes should be included in the Scorecard. Washington Conservation Voters Board of Directors and Staff then reviewed those nominations to identify votes that:

- Best reflected a clear choice about whether or not to protect the environment
- Represented a cross-section of the major environmental issues addressed during the session
- Were viewed as important by a range of conservation organizations.

This Scorecard is your tool to hold your representatives accountable. This is your way to find out if your legislators are in step with your environmental values, or if they represent special interests that seek to thwart sound environmental policy. We have included a list of email addresses and phone numbers so that you can easily contact your state Senator or Representative and let them know what you think about their scores.

Washington Conservation Voters wishes to thank the many legislators who have shown leadership on legislation that would protect, preserve and enhance this state's incredible resources. We also thank those who have consistently voted in support of the environment and citizen participation in government. And of course, we thank you, the reader, for knowing the score.

CONSERVATION CHAMPIONS

- SEN. KAREN FRASER** (D-22) is a champion on environmental policy, particularly on water resource issues. She's also dedicated to making the state a national leader in clean energy consumption.
- REP. HANS DUNSHEE** (D-39) is a tireless advocate for environmental preservation. He has worked diligently on a broad range of environmental issues, most notably protection of the state's shoreline and land use laws.
- REP. FRED JARRETT** (R-41) fought enthusiastically for transportation choices. He also worked hard to build an environmental caucus within his party.

CONSERVATION ADVOCATES

- SEN. DON CARLSON** (R-49) has worked hard over the past two years to protect open space through his efforts on the conservation futures program.
- SEN. DARLENE FAIRLEY** (D-32) is a strong and consistent supporter of programs to protect critical wildlife and habitat around the state.
- SEN. BILL FINKBEINER** (R-45) championed several pro-environment bills, including three sustainable development bills, a bill to close a loophole used by industries that discharge dangerous chemicals into our rivers and streams, and another to improve the regulation of dioxin.
- SEN. BETTI SHELDON** (D - 23) fights hard for ferries and other transportation choices, has an impressive voting record, and is a strong supporter of environmental education.
- SEN. HARRIET SPANEL** (D-40) watches over natural resource issues year in and year out. She has put her caucus leadership position to great use surrounding conservation issues.
- SEN. PAT THIBAudeau** (D- 43) is there when you need her. A long-time legislator, she is always ready to mobilize her considerable forces to help defeat bad environmental legislation.
- SEN. SHIRLEY WINSLEY** (R-28) is a strong supporter of clean air, clean water and quality of life issues.
- REP. MARY LOU DICKERSON** (D-36) is a dependable environmental voice. Her consistent support of the environmental agenda is exemplary.
- REP. RUTH FISHER** (D-27) is one of the most effective and consistent environmental legislators - ever. We wish her a warm farewell and a happy retirement.
- REP. ED MURRAY** (D-43) as chair of the House Capital Budget Committee, worked to preserve funding for programs to restore and protect salmon habitat and to provide funding for recreation areas and protection of wildlife around the state.
- REP. SANDRA ROMERO** (D-22) does it all. She sponsors pro-environmental legislation (she's passionate about "green" building), helps defeat bad environmental legislation as chair of the House State Government Committee, and is an important leadership voice in her caucus for the environment.

DISTINGUISHED DEEDS

- SEN. LISA BROWN** (D-3) put together a fantastic environmental budget in 2001 as chair of the Senate Ways & Means Committee.
- SEN. TRACY EIDE** (D-30) was the prime sponsor of SB 5533 (featured in the scorecard) that helps protect kids from pesticides in schools.
- SEN. KEN JACOBSEN** (D-46) is chair of the Senate Natural Resources Committee and championed a series of bills promoting conservation of wildlife and biodiversity around the State.
- SEN. ERIK POULSEN** (D-32) is committed to making our state a leader in clean energy consumption.
- SEN. DEBBIE REGALA** (D-27) worked to protect our marine environment from invasive nuisance species. She was also the lead negotiator for the Senate on the Natural Resources portion of the state's operating budget.
- SEN. DINO ROSSI** (R-5) is a supporter of protecting open spaces and delivered key votes on critical shoreline issues.
- SEN. JOE ZARELLI** (R-18) provided strong support to allow preservation of important recreation and habitat lands through funding in the capital budget.
- REP. JACK CAIRNES** (R-47) fought hard to pass an important public health bill improving the notice parents receive when pesticides are sprayed in schools.
- REP. MIKE COOPER** (D-21) was the prime sponsor of a House Bill on pesticides in schools. He also fought hard to include choices in our state and regional transportation plans.
- REP. SAM HUNT** (D-22) worked faithfully as the prime sponsor of a bill to ban non-essential mercury products. Sam was also a passionate supporter of increasing parental notification when pesticides are used in schools and worked successfully to make a bad energy bill (SB 5292) better.
- REP. PAT LANTZ** (D-26) was the prime sponsor of a House Bill to promote open spaces through the use of conservation easements.
- REP. KELLI LINVILLE** (D-42) worked on a visionary water policy that benefited people, farms, and fish. She was also a champion on global warming issues.
- REP. VELMA VELORIA** (D-11) is passionate about environmental justice issues and was the prime sponsor of a bill requiring additional right-to-know information on releases at hazardous waste sites.
- REP. PHIL ROCKEFELLER & SEN. BOB OKE** (D-23), (R-26) respectively, teamed up to pass two bills to protect our marine environment by removing derelict vessels and fishing gear. Rep. Rockefeller's HB 2376 provided a mechanism to remove old boats that had sunk (or are about to). Sen Oke's SB 6313 established a comprehensive system to recover lost fishing gear from commercial fishing vessels.

RISING STARS

- REPS. GLENN ANDERSON, JOE McDERMOTT, GEOFF SIMPSON, DAVE UPTHEGROVE** (R-5), (D-43), (D-47), and (D-33) respectively. As rising stars in the House of Representatives, each of these outstanding legislators has shown savvy and commitment to environmental issues in their first term.

The Watch List is a first for WCV. First, what the list isn't. This list does not identify a "dirty dozen" or an "environmental enemy list". Rather, the "Watch List" identifies Legislators who, based on their voting records, appear significantly out of touch with the environmental values of the majority of their constituents. We believe all of the Legislators on this list are capable of a much better environmental score. The environmental lobby will make it a priority to work with these legislators (and their constituents) next session to help them improve their rating.



SEN. STEVE JOHNSON

(R-47) Senator Johnson represents a suburban constituency that is increasingly pro-environment and concerned about preserving their quality of life. His seatmates (Representative Geoff Simpson and Representative Jack Cairnes) scored 100% and 55%, respectively. Sen. Johnson voting record is a disappointing 33% (13% lifetime). We see room for improvement here.

REP. STEVE KIRBY

(D-29) Representative Kirby received an environmental score of 55%. His seatmates (Senator Rosa Franklin and Representative Steve Conway) have environmental scores of 100% and 82% respectively. Representative Kirby is a seasoned Tacoma-area politician but is finishing his first term as a state Legislator. We still believe Representative Kirby has potential to be a solid environmental leader.

REP. ED ORCUTT

(R-18) Representative Orcutt was appointed to office last year. Representative Orcutt scored a 20% on his first environmental scorecard. In contrast, his predecessor (Representative John Pennington) scored 46% and sponsored several pro-environment initiatives. Re-districting has given Representative Orcutt a new constituency that will expect a much better performance in protecting the district's clean air and its clean, flowing rivers.

REP. SHARON TOMIKO SANTOS

(D-37) Representative Santos currently has an environmental score of 55%. Her seatmates (Senator Adam Kline and Representative Kip Tokuda) have environmental scores of 92% and 91% respectively. When it comes to the environment, Rep. Tomiko-Santos' voting record suggests that she is out of step with her constituency. She needs to get back in line with her voters on clean air, clean water, and sound land use planning.

REP. BEVERLY WOODS

(R-23) Representative Woods has an environmental score of 27%. Her legislative seatmates (Senator Betti Sheldon and Representative Phil Rockefeller) have scores of 92% and 73% respectively. Polling indicates that people living in the Kitsap Peninsula (23rd District) feel strongly about preserving the quality of life they currently enjoy. Representative Woods' voting record shows she is out of touch with the solid majority of her constituents.

CLEAN AIR

SB 5292 TAKING the PUBLIC OUT of PUBLIC POWER?

Through the magic of bonds, large amounts of debt can be incurred by cities, counties, and public utility districts (PUD's) using tax dollars as collateral. Reacting to the WPPSS debacle of the 70's, voters approved Initiative 394 in 1981. I-394 required major public energy projects to be put to a public vote for any new power plant capable of generating 250 megawatts or more.

After the energy hiccup last year, when there was a sharp increase in power costs, there was a cry from some circles for "more energy now!" SB 5292 responds to this cry by changing when citizens get to vote on major energy projects. While a public vote was formerly required for power plans generating 250 megawatts or more, this bill increases that to 350 megawatts or more, thereby allowing large power projects without a public vote.

House: Yes 76 - No 20. Senate: Yes 39 - No 8. The bill was passed by the legislature and signed by the Governor.

A no vote is a pro environment vote.

SB 5240 PROTECTING CLEAN AIR

Clean air is vital to our quality of life in the region. Federal law requires cars to undergo a vehicle emissions test in areas where federal air quality standards are violated. If you live (and drive) in the urban portions of Clark, King, Pierce, Snohomish, or Spokane counties, you have to get your car tested.

Over the years, Legislators have put several restrictions on the way the Department of Ecology runs the vehicle emissions testing program. First, it required that the Department must contract out the testing service to a private business. Next, it capped the fee the Department could charge at \$15 dollars. Every couple of years, Ecology puts the program out for a bid. At the time this bill was introduced, the most recent bid showed that the lowest bid was \$19 dollars and the average bid was \$25 dollars. SB 5240 authorized the Department of Ecology to raise the rate they could charge to match the bids they had been receiving from private businesses.

Senate: Yes 25 - No 24. The bill passed the Senate but died in the House and was not passed by the Legislature.

A yes vote on this bill is a vote for clean air.

HB 2326 CREATING THE CLIMATE CHANGE AND RURAL ENERGY DEVELOPMENT CENTER

Scientists are nearly unanimous that global temperatures are increasing at unprecedented rates and that human activities are to blame.

Climate change legislation has been stalled for several years in Olympia. There was some progress this year with the passage of HB2326. This bill established the Climate Change and Rural Energy Development Center within Washington State University. The Center will be a clearinghouse of information but has no power to take direct action. No funding was provided in the state budget to create the Center.

House: Yes 62 - No 36. Senate: Yes 30 - No 18. The bill passed the Legislature and was signed by the Governor.

A yes vote is a vote for the environment and our future.

DE-REGULATION: LOSING ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTIONS

HB 2866 GUTTING OUR PROTECTIONS for SALMON

People and salmon depend on clean water. That's why protecting the authority of Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is so important. The WDFW regulates activities (i.e. dredging, mining, dock-building, etc.) in our rivers, lakes, and streams.

The legislature, in its zeal to "streamline" environmental regulations, passed HB 2866 which allowed a Department of Ecology permit to substitute for a permit issued by the Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) to protect salmon. As a result, developers have fewer permits to obtain and we have fewer protections to ensure clean water for salmon.

Senate: Yes 30 - No 18. House: Yes 68 -No 28.

A no vote is an environmental vote.

HB 6609 SLAAP GIVES DEVELOPERS and CORPORATIONS MORE POWER

SLAPP, or Strategic Lawsuit Against Public Participation, is a tool developers and corporations use to stop (through legal intimidation) a group or an individual from fighting a development project.

SB 6609 gives us SLAAP, Strategic Lawsuit Against Agency Participation. This bill establishes a precedent whereby parties affected by a scientific study done by (or on behalf of) the Department of Ecology can sue the agency and recover their costs if they win.

House: Yes 71 - No 26. The bill was passed by the Legislature. The Governor lessened the damage with a partial veto.

A no vote is a pro-environment vote.

CLEAN WATER & SHORELINES

HB 2305 EXEMPTING AGRICULTURE from ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS

The Shoreline Management Act was created by Initiative in 1971 in response to years of rapid development near our rivers, lakes, and waterways. The Act requires state and local governments to plan how we use our shorelines. The Growth Management Act was created in 1990 as a response to years of poor planning, resulting in sprawl that diminishes our quality of life and increased our property taxes.

The first vote (an amendment) exempts farmers from requirements to protect 'critical areas' (those areas that reduce flooding, protect drinking water, provide wildlife habitat).

The second vote (HB 2305) exempts farmers from the requirements of the Growth Management Act (critical areas) and the Shoreline Management Act."

Vote 1 (amendment) House: Yes 51 - No 47. Vote 2: Yes 73 - No 25. The bill was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor. The final version of the bill was improved in the Senate and signed by the Governor.

A no vote (on both votes) protects clean water.

SB 6153 CLEAN WATER and SHORELINES

Protecting the shorelines next to our rivers, creeks, lakes and waterways is critical to protecting the water we drink. Since we live, work, and play on and around the waters of Washington, our quality of life also depends on shorelines.

The rules governing how we protect shorelines were put together about 30 years ago. In 1995, the Legislature directed the Department of Ecology to update those rules. Each time the Department releases a draft of the new rules, they get weaker.

This vote (an amendment to the operating budget) would have prohibited the Department of Ecology from requiring local governments to use the new shoreline rules until the Legislature provides funding. This amendment was an attempt to sidestep implementation of the new rules.

Senate: Yes 19 - No 25. The amendment failed.

A no vote is a vote to protect shorelines.

SB 6793
CREATING a BALANCED
APPROACH to WATER,
SALMON, and GROWTH

Water is critical to our way of life. Unfortunately, some communities in our state (including Puget Sound) may not have enough water to accommodate more growth. Steady population increases, sprawl, and poor planning are all taking their toll.

SB 6793 would have changed the rules to make it easier for developers to use water for growth but without proper limitations for how much water they would take. However, an amendment to SB 6793 offered a balanced, sensible approach to protect clean water and the natural habitat for fish while still providing water for new development.

Senate: Yes 24 - No 25. The well-conceived amendment failed and the underlying (bad) bill died in the House.

A yes vote (on the amendment) is a vote for a balanced approach to growth and water quality.

PROTECTING YOUR QUALITY OF LIFE

SB 5104
PROTECTING OPEN
SPACE with
CONSERVATION
FUTURES

Protecting open space is critical to protecting our way of life. The Conservation Futures program allows counties to assess an optional property tax of up to 6.25 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value. Revenue from the tax can be used to purchase open space or to acquire the development rights of agricultural or timber lands. Saving open space can save money by avoiding the costs of new development (i.e. the roads, schools, sewers that are made necessary by growth).

The bill would allow (but not require) counties to increase the amount of property tax going to the Conservation Futures program to 10 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Senate: Yes 33 - No 16. The bill has passed the Senate for the past two years but has died each year in the House.

A yes vote is a vote for the environment and your quality of life.

HB 2697
SAVING OUR PARKS

Washingtonians believe in a balanced, sensible approach to creating jobs and protecting clean air and water. An amendment to HB 2697 called for weakening the Growth Management Act by ignoring parks and ball fields when making land use decisions.

House: Yes 33 - No 65. The bill was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor.

A no vote is a pro-environment vote.

HB 6484
SAVING TAX DOLLARS and
OPEN SPACES

SB 6484 saves the environment and saves money. This bill allows those who place their land in a conservation easement to save on their federal taxes.

House: Yes 93 - No 0. The bill passed the Legislature and was signed by the Governor.

A yes vote is a vote for the environment.

SB 6400
LIVING TOGETHER: MAKING
IT EASIER for HUMANS and
WILDLIFE to CO-EXIST

SB 6400 takes a small, but important, step in bringing people together to protect clean air and water. The bill commissions a group to establish a public-private task force to undertake a study and make recommendations for managing our natural treasures. The report is due in the fall of 2003.

House: Yes 55 - No 41. Senate: Yes 36 - No 9. The bill passed the Legislature and was signed by the Governor.

A yes vote is a vote for the environment.

TRANSPORTATION CHOICES: FASTER, CHEAPER, BETTER

HB 2440
MAKING BETTER
DECISIONS ABOUT
GROWTH and
TRANSPORTATION

HB 2440 recognizes the importance of considering transportation when making decisions about growth and, conversely, considering growth when making decisions about transportation.

House: Yes 62 - No 32. A similar Senate bill (SB 5748) was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor.

A yes vote is a vote for the environment.

SB 6140
TRANSPORTATION
CHOICES that MOVE US

Protecting clean air and water is critical to protecting health. A sensible, balanced transportation package will ensure new jobs and protect our air and water. The environmental lobby worked hard to implement a "Transportation Choices" package consisting of a sensible mix of building new roads and mass transit.

The amendment to SB 6140 provided a balanced, sensible, and flexible package of transportation tools to get Washington going again.

Senate: Yes 16 - No 29. The amendment failed. The bill (The regional transportation referendum) passed the Legislature and was signed by the Governor with a partial veto. To become law, the bill must receive a majority vote from King, Pierce, and Snohomish voters when it's put on the ballot.

A yes vote is an environmental vote.

PROTECTING OUR GREATEST NATURAL RESOURCE: OUR KIDS

SB 6356
PROTECTING FUTURE
GENERATIONS from
POLLUTION TODAY

Recent studies have detected numerous chemicals in the urine of Washington State children and in breast milk of mothers. SB 6356 establishes a council of experts to ensure that we protect our kids from toxins. This bill recognizes that 500 synthetic compounds are detectable in human tissue and 70,000 chemicals are in international production and thousands of additional compounds are released into the environment as pollutants, by-products of combustion, or wastes.

Senate: Yes 39 - No 9. The bill passed the Senate but died in the House and did not pass the Legislature.

A yes vote is a vote for our health.

SB 5533
PROTECTING
OUR KIDS from
PESTICIDES

This bill, enacted in 2001, requires schools to notify parents 48 hours before spraying pesticides at schools. Under the old law, they didn't have to provide any notice. The bill also requires schools to keep records and make available a summary of pesticide use by the school or by the school district.

House: Yes 88 - No 4. Senate: Yes 43 - No 3. The bill passed the Legislature and was signed by the Governor.

A yes vote is a vote to protect our kids.

SB 6598
IMPROVING OUR
KIDS' EDUCATION

Public schools are required to provide science (including environmental) education. SB 6598 provides the state the authority to contract with private, non-profit entities to provide high-quality, hands-on science education. Studies show that kids exposed to hands-on science education do better on tests including the state WASL exam.

Senate: Yes 42 - No 6. The bill passed the Senate but died in the House and did not pass the Legislature.

A yes vote is a vote for kids.


